

④ 4.2 Critical Points, Local Max., Local Min.

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The first derivative test: Assuming $f'(c) = 0$
If $f'(x)$ changes sign from negative to
positive at $x=c$, then $f(x)$ has a local minimum
at $x=c$

④ 4.2 Critical Points, Local Maxima + Local Minima

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- For a function $f(x)$, a critical number is a number, c , in the domain of $f(x)$ such that $f'(x) = 0$ or $f'(x)$ is undefined. As a result, $(c, f(c))$ is called a critical point and usually corresponds to local or absolute extrema.

First Derivative Test

Let c be a critical number of a function f .

when moving through x -values from left to right:

- $f'(x) \rightarrow (-) \rightarrow (+)$ - local min
- $f'(x) \rightarrow (+) \rightarrow (-)$ - local max
- $f'(x) \rightarrow$ doesn't change sign - neither

Algorithm For Finding local max and local min values of a function f

- Find critical numbers of the function (that is, determine where $f'(x)=0$ and where $f'(x)$ is undefined for all x -values of domain of f)
- Use the first derivative to analyze whether f is \uparrow or \downarrow on either side of each critical number
- conclude whether each critical number locates a local max value of the function f , a local min value, or neither
